Domestic violence is a cancer in our community that slowly devours the family unit by overtaking the minds, and at times the bodies, of its victims. In times of crisis, people will often turn to their faith and faith leaders for guidance. This conference is designed to provide faith-based leaders with a holistic approach to addressing the issue of domestic violence within their congregations. Wednesday, October 13: Faith Partners Against Family Violence

Domestic violence is an equal opportunity destroyer that often hides comfortably in our congregations, growing stronger and more powerful behind the misapplication and misinterpretation of Scripture.

In order to break the stronghold that domestic violence has over our families of faith, it must be effectively confronted by our places of worship and by our entire community. This day will equip faith-based leaders with knowledge that will assist them in breaking down the stronghold of abusive behavior which enslaves so many families within their congregations. Young people are beginning to experience dating violence at earlier ages than ever before. And, with the fast-growing world of social networking, our children have access to technology that makes them increasingly vulnerable to victimization by abusive partners and strangers. This day is designed to arm parents with knowledge about abusive teen dating relationships and social networking safety. The live stage play, "Love Doesn't Hurt," will be presented.

Friday, October 15: Five Stages of Healing

Healing begins for survivors and our communities when both are able to identify and talk about the pain of domestic violence. Our community must stand with survivors of domestic violence to let them know that they are not alone. This evening program will feature a Town Hall Meeting facilitated by Dr. Oliver Williams, who will lead a discussion on the 5 Stages of Healing that will assist in the effort to make our community whole. *This evening will also feature a live performance by Andrea Tribitt of Sounds of Blackness.*

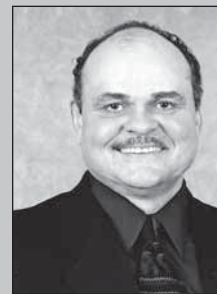

The Orthodox Church honors Mary with the title Mother of God. The Greek word is Theotokos, which means literally “God-bearer,” and it highlights Mary’s significance as the one who gave life and nourishment to the Christ who nourishes and “feeds” the life of all. Mary is the model of that holiness to which every Christian is called, and so the Church also has given her the title “Mother of Holiness.” The lecture will explore how this understanding of Mary is represented in Orthodox theology, hymnody, and iconography.



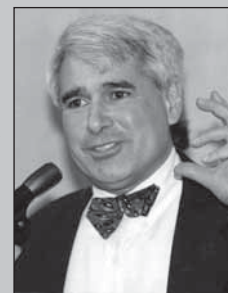
JOHN W. KINNEY

is Dean of the School of Theology at Virginia Union University and pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church, Beavertown, Virginia. In 2006, Kinney was elected Vice-President of the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada (ATS) and in June 2008, was elected President of the Association. He holds undergraduate and graduate degrees from Marshall University and Virginia Union University School of Theology and a PhD from Columbia University/Union Theological Seminary in New York.



VIGEN GUROIAN

is Professor of Religious Studies (Eastern Christianity) at the University of Virginia. He writes on a range of subjects including marriage and family, children’s literature, ecology, genocide, and medical ethics. His two volumes of Christian meditations on gardening, *Inheriting Paradise* (1999) and *The Fragrance of God* (2006), have earned him invitations to speak to gardening groups and churches across America and Great Britain. His most recent book is *The Melody of Faith: Theology in an Orthodox Key*. He holds a PhD from Drew University.

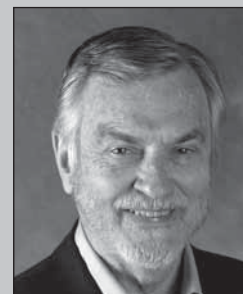


AMY-JILL LEVINE is E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Professor of New Testament Studies at Vanderbilt University Divinity School, Graduate Department of Religion, and Program in Jewish Studies. A self-described “Yankee Jewish feminist who teaches in a predominantly Christian divinity school in the buckle of the Bible Belt,” Levine combines historical-critical rigor, literary-critical sensitivity, and a dash of humor with

a commitment to eliminating anti-Jewish, sexist, and homophobic theologies. She holds a BA from Smith College, MA and PhD from Duke University. Her books include *The Misunderstood Jew: The Church and the Scandal of the Jewish Jesus* and the 14-volume *Feminist Companions to the New Testament and Early Christian Writings*.

HENDRIX is a Clinical Pastoral Counselor known internationally for his work with couples. He and his wife Helen



LaKelly Hunt, PhD co-created Imago Relationship Therapy. 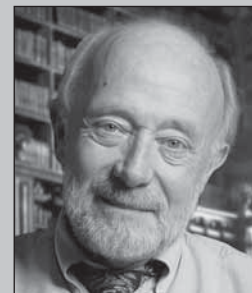
